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



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### "Success isn't given it is earned"

The sporting giants, Nike, famously coined the quote above, and it couldn't be more relevant to our fantastic success story that is detailed below.

On Tuesday 19th March, Miss Wilkinson and 11 of Woldgate's local club swimmers departed to Beverley leisure centre to compete in the KS3 East Riding Swimming Gala. The fastest eight swimmers in each heat would qualify for the final, and all swimmers would gain points for their school, dependant on the position they finished in within the heats, and the final if they made it that far. The events consisted of individual stroke races of breaststroke, backstroke and freestyle, mixed medleys and mixed relays as well. On arrival, it was lovely to see how many pupils from other schools already knew each other through their clubs and competitions, this also meant that the camaraderie and support across events and schools was amazing throughout the day.

Competitors consisted of secondary school aged pupils from Year 7 up to Year 9. Archie (Year 9) and Charlie (Year 7) finished 3rd and 2nd respectively in their heats in the first race of the morning, the backstroke, due to Archie's speedy time, he qualified to the final later on in the morning, the girls then displayed an equally fantastic performance in the backstroke, with Olivia (Year 9) finishing 2nd and Eva (Year 8) finishing 1st, which secured both girls a place in the final. The breaststroke races were next on the morning's schedule, with Alfie (Year 9), Bruno (Year 7), Alicia (Year 9) and Gracie (Year 9) all competing in this discipline, both the boys and girls finished 1st and 2nd in their heats, consequently meaning that Alfie, Alicia and Gracie all qualified for the next round with their excellent times. Moving onto the freestyle, where we saw Luke (Year









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9) compete in his first race of the morning, alongside Rose (Year 9). Luke finished first not only in his heat but qualified with the fastest time overall into the final, alongside Alfie and Gracie. The final individual events of the morning schedule were the 2 length freestyle races. This saw Luke and Bruno enter the pool in heat 2 and heat 3 for the boys and Rose and Eva enter the pool for the girls in the same heats. This race saw 3 of our Woldgate pupils qualify for the final races after the morning break.

In total, after the morning session, Woldgate had a pupil qualify for the final of all eight races, and in most cases two Woldgate swimmers had made the qualifying time, which is a fantastic achievement, but I knew that wasn't the end of the day's successes, it was only just beginning.

After the break swimmers took to the pool to compete in the relays. These were straight finals, run in three races, and the winners were determined by time alone.

Race 1: 4 x 1 length freestyle boys (Bruno, Archie, Charlie, Luke) = 1st

Race 2: 4 x 1 length freestyle girls (Susan, Liv, Rose, Alicia) = 1st

Race 3: 4 x 1 length mixed medley relay (Gracie, Alfie, Eva, Luke) = 1st

Race 4: 4 x 2 length mixed freestyle relay (Susan, Alfie, Eva, Luke) = 1st

Every single Woldgate pupil competed in a relay on the day and every single Woldgate pupil came first in their respective relay, what an absolutely unbelievable achievement. But there was still more to come.

Archie finished 3rd in his backstroke final with a time of 17.60, Olivia finished 2nd in her backstroke final with a time of 17.17. Alfie powered his way through the water to win the breaststroke final in a speedy time of 17.72. Luke was a double medallist on the day winning both the 1 length front crawl and the 2 length freestyle, landing him his 5th medal of the day.

Woldgate finished overall in 1st place across all schools within the East Riding, something that hasn't been seen in the last ten years in Woldgate's sporting history. A huge congratulations to all the swimmers that took part for their enthusiasm, sportsmanship and of course unbelievable swimming, you were excellent representatives of Woldgate.



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
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### **Personal Development Update**

### Personal Development update

This half term, Year 9 are completing a unit of work centred around the British Value of Democracy and the Personal Development theme of Living in The Outside World. They are investigating how Parliament works, how laws are made and what an MP does. This builds on work on Democracy and Governance that they completed in Year 8 when they looked at the work of local councils. They will further build on this theme of Democracy and Living in The Outside World in Year 10 when they look at the different functions of government, debate whether 16-year-olds should be able to vote and the role of the Royal Family.



### Careers Update

#### Information for aspiring medics or surgeons.

DoctorsLive are a group of doctors passionate about inspiring the next generation of students in Medicine. They have announced that their popular SugeryLive course is back this academic year. The online course gives students an immersive insight into the world of Surgery and what it's like to be in the operating room. Students also get their own full medical suturing kit through the post to learn how to suture. The course is suitable for pupils and students aged 14+.

#### SurgeryLive - Virtual Surgical Theatre Operating Experience - Saturday 6th July 2024

Their SurgeryLive course is an innovative and interactive virtual course that gives students a real glimpse of what it's like to be a surgeon in an operating theatre, delivered by practising surgeons. The day course includes:

- A glimpse into the day-to-day life of a surgeon
- Solving real-life surgical cases, including history taking and anonymized scans
- Live virtual operations showing step by step how common surgeries are carried out
- 4. Learning how to suture with a live follow-along demo (students will be sent their own suturing kit, the same ones used by medical students and doctors)
- 5. A chance for students to interact with practising surgeons and doctors

### Safeguarding at Woldgate School

As mentioned in last week's newsletter my assemblies this week and last were on the safeguarding topic of youth produced sexual imagery. I have been impressed with the level of maturity the students have displayed during my presentation and have had several speak to me following the assembly seeking support. You may be aware that the National Crime Agency's CEOP Education team has taken the unusual step of issuing an alert to education professionals following a considerable increase (more than double in the last year) in global case of financially motivated sexual extortion – types of online blackmail widely known as 'sextortion'.

Sextortion involves people being forced into paying money or meeting another financial demand, after an offender has threatened to release nude or semi-nude photos of them. This could be a real photo of the victim, or a fake image created of them by the offender.

These crimes can be perpetrated by individuals or organised crime groups, sometimes based overseas who have also been targeting and 'grooming' children.

CEOP have asked education professionals to raise awareness of this crime type and to highlight where to get support. I have included information about 'sextortion' in my assembly so the children are aware of this issue.
