




It is always wonderful to hear from those who have left us and to hear of the opportunities and experiences they are encountering. Therefore, to start with this week I wanted to share a few updates from a few students regarding their initial university experiences.

Candice is currently studying Diagnostic Radiography at Teeside University and she writes....

Diagnostic radiography is a specialist health course which focuses on diagnosing various medical conditions, using a variety of imaging techniques such as X-rays, Computed Tomography (CT), Ultrasound, and Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI). At Teesside University the course is split into 4 modules which cover the physics side of the course, regional anatomy, physiology, and general radiographic practice. These are taught through lectures, seminars, virtual reality simulators and science labs with functional radiographic equipment. My first few weeks at Teesside were made a lot easier thanks to



the patient and understanding teaching staff at Teesside and making friends on my course, which is a lot easier than people think! My biggest piece of advice for any Year 12s and 13s applying to university soon, is to always ask questions inside and outside of lessons, stay organised, and try not to fall behind, and if you do, Woldgate has many support systems in place to help you throughout your time at Sixth Form, you just need to speak up and ask for help!







Annaliesse is currently studying at Lincoln University and writes...

I'm a first year student at the University of Lincoln. At first I was really anxious and nervous and unsure if this was the pathway for me. However, after being here for a few weeks, I have decided this is the best decision for me. I have met some incredible people who I would have never met if I didn't attend uni. My flatmates and I have weekly film nights and occasionally do cooking together allowing me to experience different food which I wouldn't have had the opportunity to do before. 
start for freshers week and plan your arrival around events which you would want to attend, also don't worry about making friends as everyone is in the same boat!





Headteacher's Welcome

Everyone likes to have their hard work and effort recognised and rewarded, and we have developed a wide range of ways to recognise and celebrate pupils' achievements at Woldgate School. Recognition and celebration motivate pupils to continue to achieve; it helps to build resilience, determination and ambition, and it inspires others to work hard and achieve. Pupils receive regular Rewards from staff, that reflect the school motto that 'everything we do should be worthy, of great merit, character and value'.



We also go beyond this to ensure that outstanding achievements and recognised and rewarded. Pupils with the highest number of Rewards in each year group are celebrated in our weekly Newsletter, and pupils with the highest number of each type of Reward are also celebrated. Pupils receive certificates each week from their Head of School in recognition of this. At the end of the year, pupils with the highest number of Rewards are publicly celebrated at our Awards Ceremony at the University of York in Central Hall.

Our pupils are awarded lapel, star badges in recognition of the total number of Rewards they have earnt during their time at Woldgate School, with bronze badges representing a total of at least 500 Rewards; silver representing 1,000 Rewards, gold representing 1,500 Rewards, diamond representing 3,000 Rewards and 4,000 Rewards represent platinum. Recipients of badges also receive a certificate, and recipients of gold, diamond and platinum lapel badges have their certificate placed in the Main Hall for all pupils to see.








Our Rewards Shop also gives our pupils a tangible way to enjoy their Rewards. Our Rewards Shop is based in Great Givendale Block, and pupils can purchase items ranging from chocolate, stationery, sports equipment and shop vouchers online on the ClassCharts App or website, using the Rewards they have earnt in school. They can then collect their items from the Rewards Shop. This helps our pupils to equate dedication, determination and hard work with reward, and also encourages our pupils to practise their understanding of saving and budgeting.

We are always looking for ways to celebrate and reward our pupils for their efforts and achievements, and our School Council discuss new ideas regularly, and I look forward to sharing these with you in the future.



The Police have asked that we pass on information regarding recent concerns which have emerged regarding a WhatsApp group known as 'Add Everyone.' This group exposes children and young people to explicit and harmful material.

'Add Everyone' group chats can go by many names, but their purpose is often the same. These WhatsApp groups are spaces where children and young people are invited to join a chat that contains content such as sexual images, material promoting self-harm, sexual violence, racism and other inappropriate content. These chats may be created by adults seeking to connect with younger users or by young people themselves as a seemingly fun activity. However, as the name suggests, it is difficult to control who becomes a member of these groups, which means that access to children and young people can easily fall into the wrong hands. In some cases, the group owners ask for children to add their contacts to the group, 'except their parents'.

Next Steps and Further Advice

To protect the children in your care, consider these steps.

Encourage Open Communication

Discussing online safety with young people doesn't have to feel like a chore. Approach the topic with curiosity and openness, and have regular conversations about what you hear in the news or what their friends are doing online. This can create a comfortable space for them to share, often making it easier for young people to open up about their own situations and enable you to encourage critical thinking.

Set Privacy Settings

Work with your child to set privacy settings that ensure only their contacts can add them to groups and view their information. Remind them that friends can still add them to group chats, so discuss how to handle invitations they receive.





Adjust Auto-Saving Settings

WhatsApp can automatically save images to the user's camera roll unless adjusted in the settings. This could lead to young people unintentionally storing harmful or illegal images sent in group chats.

Screenshot, Report, and Block

If a young person is added to an inappropriate group chat, take a screenshot of the evidence* and report it directly to the platform. Encourage them to block any concerning users and to speak to a trusted adult or an organisation like Childline on 0800 1111.

*NEVER screenshot an indecent image of a child.

Please, as always be vigilant and monitor your child's use of social media. If you have any concerns please contact school so we can help.

We know that every day counts, but what does that mean?

Pupils who are not in school really do miss out. Good attendance not only has a positive impact on progress and outcomes, but also allows pupils to experience an enriched school life through a range of opportunities; enables them to build resilience and a sense of community by building long lasting friendships.

Missing a few days here and there may not seem a big deal, but research shows that it can have a significant impact on learning; falling behind peers and struggling to catch up.

If you get 90% in a test, you may be happy with the result, but 90% attendance equates to missing:

- half a day per week
- 19 days off per year or 38 sessions
- > 247 days off over their school career is equivalent of one year of lost education.

The Department for Education states that you can only allow your child to miss school if they are ill or if you have advance permission from the Headteacher.

Your child can only be off school if:

- ➤ They are ill. If they are ill for more than 3 days, there will be an expectation that you will have had a medical appointment, therefore any days after this may be marked as unauthorised if medical evidence is not provided.
- They are attending a doctor or hospital appointment
- They are going to a meeting about a Children's Hearing or court
- They are involved in an activity and the school agrees to authorise the absence in advance





SEND & Attendance

- Someone close to your child has died
- > There is a crisis or serious difficult at home or in your family
- > They are attending a religious ceremony or wedding of someone very close to them
- > You are a Traveller/Gypsy family and while you are travelling you are in touch with the school

➤ Your family is returning to a country of origin for cultural reasons or to care for a relative.

Which Absences are not authorised?

Certain types of absences will be marked as unauthorised, unless there are exceptional circumstances, agreed by the Headteacher.

Absences where the parents or carers have not informed school of the reason are also recorded as unauthorised.

If your child is late to school and the registers are closed, this will be marked as an unauthorised absence.
